



#### **CERC** in an Infectious Disease Outbreak

- Be First: Quickly sharing information about a disease outbreak can help stop the spread of disease, and prevent and reduce illness and even death.
   People often remember the first information they hear in an emergency, so the first information they receive should come from health experts.
  - Even if the cause of the outbreak or specific disease is unknown, share facts that are available.
     This can help you stay ahead of possible rumors.
  - Share information about the signs and symptoms of disease, who is at risk, treatment and care options, and when to seek medical care.
- Be Right: Accuracy establishes credibility. Information should include what is known, what is not known, and what is being done to fill in the information gaps.
  - Public health messages and medical guidance must complement each other. For example, public health officials should not widely encourage people to go to the doctors if doctors are turning people away and running out of medicine for critically ill people.
  - Always fact check with subject-matter experts.
     One incorrect message can cause harmful behaviors and may result in people losing trust in future messages.
- Be Credible: Honesty, timeliness, and scientific evidence encourage the public to trust your information and guidance. Acknowledge when you do not have enough information to answer a question and then work with the appropriate experts to get an answer.
  - Do not make promises about anything that is not yet certain, such as distribution of vaccines or medications without confirmed availability.
  - Clinicians should be present at press or community events to answer medical questions.

- Express Empathy: Disease outbreaks can cause fear and disrupt daily lives. Lesser-known or emerging diseases cause more uncertainty and anxiety. Acknowledging what people are feeling and their challenges shows that you are considering their perspectives when you give recommendations.
  - For example, during a telebriefing for the coronavirus disease 2019 response:
     "Being quarantined can be disruptive, frustrating, and feel scary. Especially when the reason for quarantine is exposure to a new disease for which there may be limited information."
- Promote Action: In an infectious disease outbreak, public understanding of and action on disease prevention is key to stopping the spread.
  - Keep action messages simple, short, and easy to remember, like "cover your cough."
  - Promote action messages in different ways to make sure they reach those with disabilities, limited English proficiency, and varying access to information
- Show Respect: Respectful communication is particularly important when people feel vulnerable. Respectful communication promotes cooperation and rapport. Actively listen to the issues and solutions brought up by local communities and local leadership.
  - Acknowledge different cultural beliefs and practices about diseases, and work with communities to adapt behaviors and promote understanding.
  - Do not dismiss fears or concerns. Give people a chance to talk and ask questions.

### **SHARE FACTS ABOUT COVID-19**

Know the facts about coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) and help stop the spread of rumors.

FACT 1

Diseases can make anyone sick regardless of their race or ethnicity.

Fear and anxiety about COVID-19 can cause people to avoid or reject others even though they are not at risk for spreading the virus.

ACT 2

For most people, the immediate risk of becoming seriously ill from the virus that causes COVID-19 is thought to be low.

Older adults and people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions may be at higher risk for more serious complications from COVID-19.

FACT 3 Someone who has completed quarantine or has been released from isolation does not pose a risk of infection to other people.

FACT 4 There are simple things you can do to help keep yourself and others healthy.

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing; going to the bathroom; and before eating or preparing food.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- · Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.

- Fever
- Cough
- · Shortness of breath

### Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) and you

#### What is coronavirus disease 2019?

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The wrus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan. China.

#### Can I get COVID-19?

Yes. COVID-19 is spreading from person to person in parts of the world. Risk of infection from the virus that causes COVID-19 is higher for people who are close contacts of someone known to have COVID-19, for example healthcare workers, or household members. Other people at higher risk for infection are those who live in or have recently been in an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19.

#### How does COVID-19 spread?

The virus that causes COVID-19 probably emerged from an animal source, but its now spreading from person to person. The virus is thought to spread manily between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It also may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads. #### What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe respiratory tilness with symptoms of:

- fever
- · cough
- · shortness of breath



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#### What are severe complications from this virus?

Some patients have pneumonia in both lungs, multi-organ failure and in some cases death.

### People can help protect themselves from respiratory illness with everyday preventive actions.

- · Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.

### If you are sick, to keep from spreading respiratory illness to others, you should

- · Stay home when you are stck.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

### What should I do if I recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19?

If you have traveled from an affected area, there may be restrictions on your movements for up to 2 weeks. If you develop symptoms during that period (fever, cough, trouble breathing), seek medical advice. Call the office of your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel and your symptoms. They will give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness. While stck, avoid contact with people, don't go out and delay any travel to reduce the possibility of spreading tilness to others.

#### Is there a vaccine?

There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to take everyday preventive actions, like avoiding close contact with people who are stck and washing your hands often.

#### Is there a treatment?

There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19. People with COVID-19 can seek medical care to help relieve symptoms.

### What to do if you are sick with coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)

If you are sick with COVID-19 or suspect you are infected with the virus that causes COVID-19, follow the steps below to help prevent the disease from spreading to people in your home and community.

#### Stay home except to get medical care

You should restrict activities outside your home, except for getting medical care. Do not go to work, school, or public areas. Avoid using public transportation, ride-sharing, or taxis.

#### Separate yourself from other people and animals in your home

People: As much as possible, you should stay in a specific room and away from other people in your home. Also, you should use a separate bathroom, if available.

Animals: Do not handle pets or other animals while sick. See COVID-19 and Antmals for more information.

#### Call ahead before visiting your doctor

If you have a medical appointment, call the healthcare provider and tell them that you have or may have COVID-19. This will help the healthcare provider's office take steps to keep other people from getting infected or exposed.

#### Wear a facemask

You should wear a facemask when you are around other people (e.g., sharing a room or vehicle) or pets and before you enter a healthcare provider's office. If you are not able to wear a facemask (for example, because it causes trouble breathing), then people who live with you should not stay in the same room with you, or they should wear a facemask if they enter

#### Cover your coughs and sneezes

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw used tissues in a lined trash can; immediately wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60-95% alcohol covering all surfaces of your hands and rubbing them together until they feel dry. Soap and water should be used preferentially if hands are visibly dirty.

#### Avoid sharing personal household items

You should not share dishes, drinking glasses, cups, eating utenstls, towels, or bedding with other people or pets in your home. After using these items, they should be washed thoroughly with soap and water.



#### Clean your hands often

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol, covering all surfaces of your hands and rubbing them together until they feel dry. Soap and water should be used preferentially if hands are visibly dirty. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

#### Clean all "high-touch" surfaces every day

High touch surfaces include counters, tabletops, doorknobs, bathroom fixtures, totlets, phones, keyboards, tablets, and bedstde tables. Also, clean any surfaces that may have blood, stool, or body fluids on them. Use a household cleaning spray or wipe, according to the label instructions. Labels contain tnstructions for safe and effective use of the cleaning product including precautions you should take when applying the product, such as wearing gloves and making sure you have good ventilation during use of the product.

#### Monitor your symptoms

Seek prompt medical attention if your illness is worsening (e.g., difficulty breathing). Before seeking care, call your healthcare provider and tell them that you have, or are being evaluated for, COVID-19. Put on a facemask before you enter the facility. These steps will help the healthcare provider's office to keep other people in the office or waiting room from getting infected

Ask your healthcare provider to call the local or state health department. Persons who are placed under active monitoring or facilitated self-monitoring should follow instructions provided by their local health department or occupational health professionals, as appropriate.

If you have a medical emergency and need to call 911, notify the dispatch personnel that you have, or are being evaluated for COVID-19. If possible, put on a facemask before emergency medical services arrive.

#### Discontinuing home isolation

Patients with confirmed COVID-19 should remain under home isolation precautions until the risk of secondary transmission to others is thought to be low. The decision to discontinue home tsolation precautions should be made on a case-by-case basis, in consultation with healthcare providers and state and local health departments.

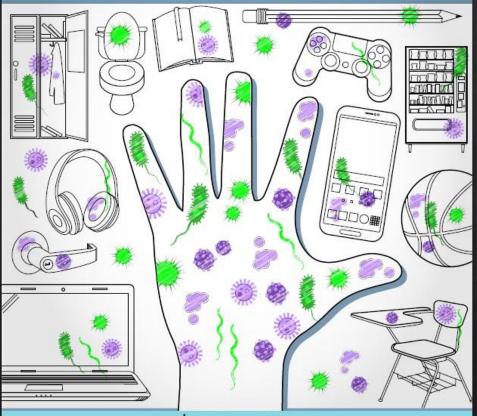

### **VISITATION SECURITY**

- \* All visitors are required to clear a walk through metal detector. After three (3) unsuccessful attempts of clearing the walkthrough metal detector, the visitor shall be denied entrance and it shall be explained that he/she can come back during the next visitation period or another day. All visitors are subject to a frisk search as needed.
- VISITORS WITH MEDICAL DEVICES AND/OR MEDICAL IMPLANTS, SUCH AS PACEMAKERS ARE REQUIRED TO NOTIFY THE RECEPTIONIST AND SECURITY OFFICERS OF THEIR MEDICAL DEVICES BEFORE THEY ARE PROCESSED IN THE FACILITY FOR VISITATION.
- \* The **ONLY** items allowed for visitation are: **I.D.'s and Keys.** All "other items" must be secured in the <u>PUBLIC LOBBY LOCKERS</u> for \$0.50 or <u>VEHICLE</u> at your own risk.

### **Tobacco Free Facility**

Any person who knowingly gives or sells any tobacco product, including vapors products, as defined in G.S. 148-23.1 to an inmate or to a person who is not an inmate, for delivery to an inmate in the custody of a local confinement facility, is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

Any inmate of a local confinement facility who possesses any tobacco product, as defined in G.S. 148-23.1, other than for authorized religious purposes, is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

### **Cell Phone Free Facility**

Any person who knowingly gives or sells a mobile telephone or other wireless communications device, or a component of one of those devices, to an inmate or to a person who is not an inmate, for delivery to an inmate in the custody of a local confinement facility, is guilty of a Class H felony.

Any inmate of a local confinement facility who possesses a mobile telephone or other wireless communications device or a component of one of those devices, is guilty of a Class H felony.

### Instalación libre de tabaco

Cualquier persona que a sabiendas da o vende cualquier producto de tabaco, incluidos los productos de vapores, tal como se define en GS 148-23.1 a un preso o a una persona que no es un preso, para su entrega a un preso bajo la custodia de un centro de confinamiento local, es culpable de un delito menor de clase 1.

Cualquier recluso de una instalación de confinamiento local que posea cualquier producto de tabaco, según se define en G.S. 148-23.1, que no sea para fines religiosos autorizados, es culpable de un delito menor de Clase 1.

### Instalación gratuita de teléfono celular

Cualquier persona que a sabiendas le dé o venda un teléfono móvil u otro dispositivo de comunicaciones inalámbrico, o un componente de uno de esos dispositivos, a un preso o a una persona que no sea un preso, para entregarlo a un preso bajo la custodia de un confinamiento local instalación, es culpable de un delito grave de clase H.

Cualquier preso de una instalación de confinamiento local que posea un teléfono móvil u otro dispositivo de comunicaciones inalámbrico o un componente de uno de esos dispositivos, es culpable de un delito mayor de Clase H.

- \* Inmates are allowed Two (2) adult visits per week. (Sunday through Saturday)
- \* Visitors under the age of sixteen (16) do not require an I.D. and they "do not" count as a visitor. Only two (2) children per adult are permitted.
- \* Any visitor under the age of eighteen (18) years must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Documentation of legal guardianship must be provided to detention staff. The accompanied minor by a parent or legal guardian counts as a visitor.
- \* NOTE: The parent or legal guardian must remain with the visitor under the age of 18 for the duration of the visit. Failure to properly supervise children may result in the visitation termination and/or removal from the public lobby.

- ♦ NOTA: El padre o tutor legal debe permanecer con el visitante menor de 18 años durante la visita. El no supervisar adecuadamente a los niños puede resultar en la terminación de la visita y / o el retiro del lobby público.

### VISITATION DRESS CODE

Forsyth County Law Enforcement Detention Center visitors are required to dress in appropriate attire when visiting inmates.

- No sundresses or shirts that are backless
- \* No one-shoulder or off-shoulder blouses or tops
- \* No tank top male or female
- \* No hats or head coverings
- \* No clothing that will reveal female breast or excessive cleavage
- \* No clothing that exposes midriffs or belly buttons
- \* No mini skirts or shorts that do not reach mid-thigh
- No boots/shoes with metal
- \* No house / bedroom shoes
- \* No clothing with offensive logos, pictures, and / or writing
- No pants worn below the waistline that exposes the buttock area
- \* NOTE: Individuals that are inappropriately dressed for visitation will be "DENIED"
